An abstract summarizes the major aspects of a paper. It should succinctly summarize the purpose of the paper, the methods used, the major results, and conclusions.

Authors are requested to submit the extended abstracts in electronic form (MS-Word) via our Online Submission. Please ensure the extended abstract has a **minimum of 4 pages and maximum of 5 pages** in the length excluding the references. The **pages**

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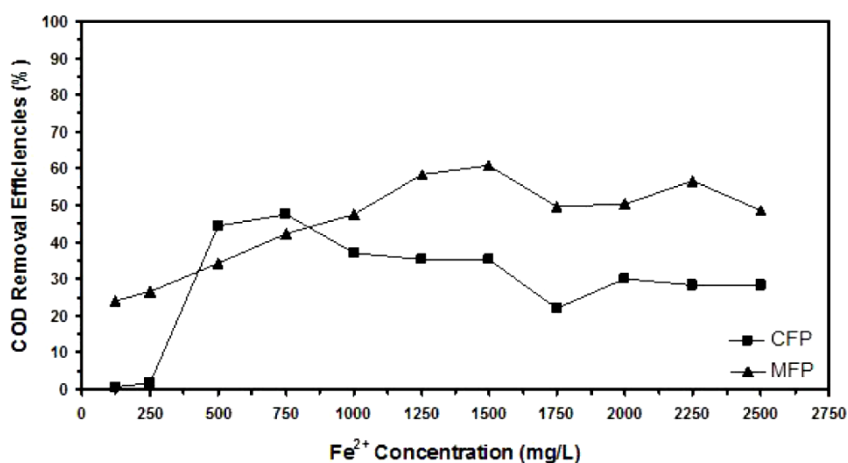
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## METHODOLOGY
